

In Camp

Feb 21st 1886

My Darling Wife

Last night there was
a Poker and Whist party at
Bolmans. in town and we all
went down and staid all night -
Mr Bolman St-Beck (our own) Miller and Shell
and Mr Stevens played Poker -

Mr Bolman ~~Stevens~~^{Stevens} Mr Adler and Self
Seven up and Whist &c - Mr Everts
and mine to see Mac Adams - who has
Rheumatism already.

They all played till after one
o'clock - when I went to bed being
miserably tired - The rest played on
till nearly morning - when St-Beck
started South by coach for Howie -
St-Beck - started home by ambulance
and the rest of us after dinner came
out to Camp - I have a letter to write

of neuralgia today and am full
of Grains. Have written to Jordan
to get - you papers - to Bowie Stalant
and return - His letter should
arrive with this one. So tackle
him about it - when this comes - I
will send you a check in a day or
two for 100.00 but tell Berrett
it is coming and charge me with
\$28 50 on the right-hand side same
as if you had drawn it - that day.
Don't pack up anything for me
excepting some more old underclothes
if any are left - and buy another
pair of Sheets and 2 pillow slips
and one more pillow - You will need
them when you stay overnight - in Camb -
I have already a double bunk - a very
comfortable one - Discharge the girl
or dispose of her any way you feel
like - and make things safe about
the house. You had better not bring
any jewelry with you leaving Storia

in it - as this country is demanded and
such things are a bother when you
want to run around.

Draw and pay every thing
that needs paying - and set bills for
the balance 25⁰⁰ will be enough
for you to start with in Cash - After
getting a sleeper - make Denver Route
for you - and set you off here
has nothing else to do. I will

have Mr. Holburn or Captain
Whitney meet you and set you off
in the stage - and will meet you
on the way - It is only 38 miles
to Dolomiteville. The stage sets in
at 1 P.M. - do not start on Thursday

as the run is two days and you set
in in the afternoon. Saturday - and there
is no stage Sunday. Remember this
